**Admission to the Museum is free for children dressed in a costume and Detroit Historical Society Members.** “Puppet Guy” **Richard Paul** will entertain guests with his “Ha Ha Halloween Show” in the Louise C. Booth Auditorium at 2:30 p.m. and 3:30 p.m. In addition, there will be treats (without the tricks!), pumpkin decorating, and lots of fun!

The Detroit Historical Museum, located at 5401 Woodward Ave. (NW corner of Kirby) in Detroit’s Cultural Center area, is open to the public Wednesday through Friday from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday from Noon to 5 p.m. On Mondays and Tuesdays, the Museum is not open to the public but available for group tours by calling **(313) 833-7979.** Adult admission is \$6. Seniors (60+), college students with valid college ID, and youth ages 5-17 pay \$4. Admission for children ages four and under is free. Parking in the Museum’s lot is \$4 at all times. Permanent exhibits include the famous *Streets of Old Detroit, Frontiers to Factories, The Motor City,* and *The Glancy Trains.* New exhibits include *Hero or Villain? Metro Detroit’s Legacy of Leadership; Fabulous 5: Entertainment Venues; 1920s: Detroit’s Building Boom; 100 Years Ago; New to the Collection,* a display of recently acquired antiquities, oddities, and treasures; the *Detroit Artist Showcase* featuring early 20th century artist Amy Lorimer; and *Automotive Showplace,* spotlighting the Model T Centennial.
