**EXPLORE DETROIT'S MOST FAMOUS LANDMARKS JANUARY 8th AT THE  
DETROIT HISTORICAL MUSEUM**

**DETROIT** – The Detroit Historical Society's Scholar Series continues with a program featuring Loren Estleman, author of "Amos Walker's Detroit" and award-winning landscape photographer Monte Nagler. They will present images of well-known landmarks throughout Detroit on Tuesday, January 8th from 6 – 8 p.m. at the Detroit Historical Museum.

"Amos Walker's Detroit" visits many of Detroit's well-known landmarks, including the Renaissance Center, the Wayne County Building, Belle Isle, and Mexicantown. The book features photographs of these and other famous Detroit landmarks, as well as images of shadows along the Cass Corridor shot by award-winning landscape photographer Monte Nagler. The photographs are accompanied by excerpts from Estleman's novels describing their location.

The Detroit Historical Museum, located at 5401 Woodward Ave. in Detroit's Cultural Center area, is open to the public Wednesday through Friday from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday from Noon to 5 p.m. On Mondays and Tuesdays, the Museum is not open to the public but available for group tours by calling (313) 833-7979. Adult admission is \$6. Seniors (60+), college students with valid college ID, and youth ages 5-18 pay \$4. Admission for children ages four and under is free. Parking in the Museum's lot is \$3 at all times. Permanent exhibits include the famous Streets of Old Detroit, Frontiers to Factories, The Motor City, and The Glancy Trains. New exhibits include 1920s: Detroit's Building Boom; Rallying the Home Front: Posters from WWII; New to the Collection, a showcase of recently acquired antiquities, oddities, and treasures; the Detroit Artist Showcase featuring early 20th century artist Amy Lorimer; Fabulous 5: Detroit Sports Legends; and Automotive Showplace.
