**DETROIT** - Do you have a story to tell about where you were and what you were doing during the events of July 1967? We are looking to interview individuals from the region that had **significant firsthand experiences** with the events surrounding the July 1967 civil unrest.

The *Detroit 67* Project team will host a story collection day to meet with you and hear your history on **Saturday, June 18 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.** at the Detroit Historical Museum.
