FREE WINTER FILM SERIES CONTINUES ON FEBRUARY 13 AND 14 AT THE DETROIT HISTORICAL MUSEUM AND THE DOSSIN GREAT LAKES MUSEUM

DETROIT- The Detroit Historical Society's Winter Film Series continues with two exciting features in February! Watch **"The Loving Story"** at **3 p.m. on Saturday, February 13 and Sunday, February 14 at the Detroit Historical Museum** and **"America's Ancient Industry"** at **2 p.m. on Saturday, February 13 and Sunday, February 14 at the Dossin Great Lakes Museum**. Admission for the museums and movie screenings is FREE!

More about the films:

- **"The Loving Story"**: Mildred and Richard Loving knew it was illegal for a black woman and a white man to be married in the state of Virginia during the 1950s, but neither expected to be woken up and arrested in their own home one night in 1958. The documentary brings to life the Lovings' marriage and the legal battle that followed through little-known filmed interviews and photographs shot for *Life* magazine. Made possible by the National Endowment for the Humanities' *Created Equal: America's Civil Rights Struggle* program. Running time 77 minutes.
- **"Americas Ancient Industry"**: Imagine a prosperous industry that existed near Lake Superior long before Stonehenge and the Pyramids were built. No one knows who these ancient copper miners were, but thousands of mine pits and tools of their past were left to help piece together this great Michigan mystery. Running Time 60 minutes.

The Society's Film Series features free monthly screenings of fascinating Detroit films at the Detroit Historical Museum and the Dossin Great Lakes Museum. Upcoming films include:

Permanent exhibits include the famous *Streets of Old Detroit*, the *Allesee Gallery of Culture*, *Kid Rock Music Lab*, *Doorway to Freedom: Detroit and the Underground Railroad*, *Detroit: The "Arsenal of Democracy,"* the *Gallery of Innovation*, *Frontiers to Factories*, *America's Motor City*, and *The Glancy Trains*. The **Dossin Great Lakes Museum** is located at 100 Strand Drive on Belle Isle. Admission is free for all, all the time. Permanent exhibits include *Built by the River* in the John A. and Marlene L. Boll Foundation Gallery, the *Miss Pepsi* vintage 1950s championship hydroplane, the Gothic Room from the *City of Detroit III* in the Polk Family Hall, a bow anchor from the S.S. *Edmund Fitzgerald*, the pilothouse from the Great Lakes freighter S.S. *William Clay Ford* in the Wayne and Joan Webber Foundation Gallery, and one of the largest known collections of scale model ships in the world.
